Present perfect continuous with 'for' and 'since'

You form the present perfect continuous: form of have been + ing-form

I / you / we / they have been reading He / she / it has been reading I / you / we / they haven't been reading He/she/it hasn't been reading Have I / you / we / they been reading? Has he / she / it been reading?

You USe the present perfect continuous:

· To talk about an action that has just stopped or recently stopped.

I am tired (now) because I have been running since this morning.

The grass is wet (now) because it has been raining for hours.

An action that started in the past and is continuing up till now.

I have been reading for two hours.

We have been talking since nine o'clock.

- · You use the present perfect continuous with **since** or **for**.
 - * You use **for** to talk about **a period of time**: 5 minutes, 2 weeks, 6 years.

I have been listening for hours.

He has been playing football for a long time.

* You use **since** to talk about **a point in the past time**: 9 o'clock, 1st January, Monday.

I have been watching TV since 7pm.

He has been living in Belgium since he left school.


